Ford Enjoying Post-election Honeymoon

New Forum Research poll finds that Rob Ford is enjoying a remarkably high approval rating.

With the dust settling after the recent Toronto municipal election, a new poll conducted by Toronto-based Forum Research Inc. takes a look at the approval rating of Mayor Rob Ford and public opinion of Toronto residents concerning several issues facing the City today.

Among Toronto residents aged 18+, 6 in 10 residents approve of the job Rob Ford is going as the Mayor of Toronto (60%). Approval of the Mayor was highest in Scarborough (71%), and North York (65%), and lowest in Toronto East York (46%). Ford's approval as Mayor was also higher among older residents (49% 18-34, 63% 35-54, and 67% 55+).

Toronto residents were also asked a series of questions concerning issues facing the City of Toronto. Issues related to the TTC garnered significant approval from residents with over 7 in 10 approving of the idea of 'declaring the TTC an essential service that would ban TTC strikes and lockouts' (72%), and just over 6 in 10 approving 'using private sector financing for the Sheppard subway so it can be built sooner' (61%). Support was highest in Scarborough and North York (68%, 66% respectively).

Residents were asked whether below ground subways or above ground light rail streetcars were the best means to improve public transit in the City. The majority supported the idea of adding more below ground subways (63%, compared to 37% for above ground light rail streetcars). Residents in Scarborough and North York were significantly more likely to support the idea of below ground subways as opposed to above ground LRT when compared to those living in Toronto East York (75% and 65% respectively, compared to 54%). In addition to this the majority also support reducing TTC service on some routes with low ridership in order to avoid raising fares (57%).

Residents were also asked about transportation in general in Toronto. Over half of those polled favoured 'licensing bicyclists so that traffic laws can be enforced with them' (56%) while just over 4 in 10 approved of 'tearing down the eastern end of the Gardiner expressway' (44%).

The poll also touched on some City issues related to the efficiency of municipal services. A majority are in favour of 'the privatization of garbage collection for parts of the City (54%)'. Of interest, support for the privatization of garbage collection was highest among those residents in Etobicoke / York (61%) where

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collection have been private for 16 years and has resulted in savings of roughly \$1.8 million a year, according to a 2007 audit.

In addition, the majority oppose 'spending \$3 million to hire an outside consultant to look at ways to make the City more efficient' (62%), and 'providing jobs for life for City of Toronto employees' (63%).

Even prior to the Auditor General's critical report on Toronto Housing it was found that Toronto residents prefer the idea of providing rent subsidies for privately owned housing (65%) rather than developing additional City owned social housing (35%) to improve access to those in need.

The poll was conducted by Forum Research with the results based on an interactive voice response telephone survey of 1,012 randomly selected residents of Toronto aged 18 or older. The poll was conducted from February 25th to February 26th, 2011. Results are considered accurate +/- 3.1%, 19 times out of 20. This research is not necessarily predictive of future outcomes, but rather captures opinion at one point in time. The poll was sponsored by Forum Research Inc. as a public service.
